- In 1900 she read a newspaper where they were looking for players for a tournament. He signed up and convinced some French

competitions of golf, tennis and croquet were opened and women had the possibility to participate.







Margaret's passion


- She started when she was young.

- The combination of skill, patience, and perseverance required by golf was what she enjoyad the most about the sport.



1900 Olympics

- In 1900 the Olympic Games were held in Paris.
- The games included a wide variety of sports and the event was less organized.
- The women golf competition was held at the Sporting Club de Paris and only 10 women participated.
- Margaret Abbott won with a score of 47.
- Many athletes, including Margaret, did not realize they were participating in the Olympic Games.





No medal For Margaret

- The prize was a porcelain bowl, the ugliest prize in sports history.
- Medals were not intended for women because they had to be rewarded with decorative objects for the house.
- Pierre de Coubertin (the founder of Olympic games) was not in favour of women's participation at the Olympics, considering them inferior.
 - Margaret died in 1955, without knowing that she had won an Olympic title.
 - Margaret was the first woman winner of the Olympic Games, she was the Champion who paved the way for women emancipation in the world of sports.



• This achievement remained unique for a long time, as golf was not regularly included in the Olympics until 2016.

 Her story is now a symbol of determination and progress for women in sports.
