

DFFICULTIES


- Ronda was criticized for her attitude and for some losses, such as the one against Holly Holm.

SPORTS

Ronda played many sports: Judo, mixed martial arts and wrestling but what she has dedicated all her life is judo....

Her success began in 2001 when at just fourteen she won the Coupe Canada Senior Tournament. In 2004 she qualified for the Athens Olympics, where she was the youngest judoka of the tournament; she has eliminated in the first round by Austrian Claudia Heill.



In 2006 she became the first American athlete in ten years to win an A-level tournament, at the World Championships in Birmingham. The same year she also won a bronze medal at the Junior World Championships, becoming the first US athlete to win two medals at the Junior World Championships. In 2007 she moved to the 70 kg category, in which she won the silver medal at the World Championships in Rio de Janeiro. Ronda took part in the expedition for the Beijing 2008 Olympics, she was defeated in the quarter-finals by the former World Champion but in the repêchage valid for the two bronze medals available. Rondo defeated all tree of her opponents and won the first Olympic medal in women is judo in the history of the United States.
